This Stage 1 – Drought Watch condition applies to all System reservoirs except Lake Proctor, which is currently under the Stage 2 – Drought Warning condition.

Therefore, the BRA is implementing a Stage 1 – Drought Watch condition for the BRA water supply System. The stated goals in Stage 1 – Drought Watch of the Plan are to raise awareness of the developing drought situation and achieve a voluntary five percent (5%) reduction of the water use that would have occurred in the absence of any drought contingency measures.

If you have already taken action in accordance with Stage 1 Drought Watch declarations issued earlier this year for specific reservoirs within the basin, no further action is required. If not, we ask that you take action consistent with Stage 1 of the BRA Plan to achieve a five percent (5%) reduction in your water use. Activities that you should consider include:

- 1. Activate your entity's Drought Contingency Plan;
- 2. Increase public education efforts on ways to reduce water use;
- 3. Notify customers of actions being taken; and
- 4. Any other actions you deem appropriate for your situation.
