As we are all aware, drought conditions have continued to expand in the Brazos River Basin and are starting to impact reservoir levels. The Brazos River Authority's (BRA) Drought Contingency Plan (Plan) includes several lake level triggering criteria for different stages of drought. Due to the drier than normal conditions and associated water supply demands from Lake Proctor, its water surface elevation has dropped below the Stage 1 Drought Watch trigger of 1158.2 feet above mean sea level.
